

This time of the year is a perfect time to reflect on the year's goals, accomplishments and those things for which we are thankful ....2012 was an exceptional year for HPZS.

As we look back at the many accomplishments and successes for this past year, we see many record breaking numbers in visitation in almost every event and program offered as well as many new offerings.

Events such as Easter's Eggstravagaza, Zoo By Moonlight in summer, our annual Community Appreciation Day, Zoo Fest in fall, Boo at the Zoo and our Spring, Summer and Fall Zoo Camps all exceeded visitor turnouts from previous years.

With the success and community support for these annual events we also enjoyed a host of new events for this year. These first year events included; Wet n Wild Water Day in August, summer "Zoovies", and the first annual "Taste of the Wild" fundraising event held in October. Other popular returning events included: the Breakfast with the Animals program, held each month in the spring and fall; Dollar Days; Nocturnal Nature Nights; and Members' Night animal previews.

We continue to celebrate the record breaking year with an institutional record of 180 collection animals, the highest number of collection animals since our opening, 24 years ago. We welcome the newest members of the collection which include; fire belly toads, "Max" the Blue & Gold macaw, "Blueberry" and "George" the Nigerian Dwarf goats, Miniature horses "Aaron," "Dolly" and "Charity," 2 orphaned Javelina, 2 Green Cheeked Conures, Stella the young raccoon, the acquisition of the new female Mexican Grey Wolf, one baby Black Bear cub and 13 additional arachnids (tarantulas, scorpions and spiders) for the Grotto exhibit that will all call HPZS home.

Our wildlife conservation program set an all time record high of 445 calls thus far this year with 267 wildlife rescues which required triage, care and rehabilitation.

We continued our successful dual membership partnership with Highlands Center for Natural History, as well as forming new partnerships with Az. Game and Fish Department for additional resources to increase our capacity for wildlife calls and triage.

Join us for our seasonal holiday lights event "Wildlights and Animal Sights" going on now through December 29, every Friday and Saturday from 6:00 – 9:00. Our opening night met with a record number of visitors of 310!

The biggest success in 2012 comes from you, our supporters. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit, Heritage Park Zoological Sanctuary relies on the help of our donors. We are asking for your financial assistance again in 2013 to support our education programs, our animal rescue programs and, of course, to provide for the care of the animals here at the Sanctuary.



## WHAT ABOUT THE BEARS?






























# HELP THE ANIMALS AT HERITAGE PARK ZOOLOGICAL SANCTUARY THIS WINTER.

2012 has been an eventful year at Heritage Park Zoological Sanctuary. A record number of rescue animals have come through the doors. Although many of these animals have been rehabilitated and released back to the wild, many have become temporary or permanent residents of HPZS.

Every winter, when gate admissions decrease, animal food and shelter costs increase. This year, due to the increase in collection animals, your help is especially needed to help support our animals through the winter.

In late summer, Heritage Park Zoological Sanctuary received a call from Arizona Game and Fish that they had two rescued orphaned baby bear cubs whose mother was hit by a car who needed a home. HPZS willingly took in the cubs. Not a month later, AZGFD brought another baby bear to the Sanctuary after notoriously breaking into a house and eating a chocolate cake. A week after that, two more baby bears came to the Sanctuary. All of the bears were accommodated and given homes, if only temporarily. It has been many years since Shash, the resident Black Bear was a cub this size, so keepers were surprised at the amount these baby bears eat! And during the winter, these bears will eat even more to keep their weight up.

In spring, an orphaned deer fawn arrived at Heritage Park Zoological Sanctuary. This deer was too young to survive on its own and had to be lovingly bottle fed every 3 hours around the clock by dedicated keepers and volunteers. During the cold winter months, this baby, along with many other animals at the Sanctuary, will need extra straw and shelter to help him stay warm.

We are asking for your help this winter season to donate what you can toward the magnificent animals here at Heritage Park Zoological Sanctuary.

Heritage Park Zoological Sanctuary is a 501(c)(3) non-profit wildlife organization that receives no city, state or federal support. All the funds that keep the Sanctuary running and allow for programs like the Education and Wildlife Rescue to continue come from gate admissions, annual memberships and contributions from donors like you.
